Neighbourhood Policing Fund Community Support Officers

We have been allocated 18 additional CSOs from Round 1. They will be placed in Plymouth and S/W Devon BCUs, each receiving 9 posts. All police authorities have received CSO funding for 2005/6 but the number supported is weighted heavily in favour of BCUs with no previous allocation, high crime and anti-social behaviour. Future rounds are to be announced in Sprina 2005.

THE BIG LOTTERY (BLF)

Sir Clive Booth, chairman of the BLF, has warned that he would resign, and probably take his board with him, if there is any government interference in how lottery money should be spent. He will not tolerate any dictate from Whitehall if they do not reflect the agreed themes of the fund. The Big Lottery Fund still supports the "disadvantaged", and he announced plans to launch two new funding programmes for international aid and research. The board also accepted that lottery money is additional to any government funding, and is not intended to replace it and in future up to 70% per cent of fund income

will go to the voluntary and community sector - an increase on the contribution made by the two previous funds.




